Weekly Australian Climate, Water and Agricultural Update 27 October 2011

Summary of key issues

- Rainfall received this week over parts of southern Australia will assist grain fill in crops in the lead up to harvest.
- Lightning associated with stormy weather has reportedly started a number of large fires throughout western Queensland. The grassfires burning last week were contained but have caused pasture damage in some areas.
- Large numbers of cotton bollworms have been found in canola crops in the north-west cropping region of New South Wales.
- The tropical Pacific Ocean is now in the early stages of a late-forming La Niña event. Indications are that this event will be considerably weaker than the strong 2010–11 event (Bureau of Meteorology ENSO 'Wrap-up', 26 October 2011).
- Wetter than average conditions are favoured over much of Australia for the November 2011 to January 2012 period. Warmer temperatures are favoured over parts of southeast Australia (Bureau of Meteorology National Seasonal Rainfall and Temperature Outlooks, 25 October 2011).
- The world coarse grains indicator price (US no. 2 yellow corn, free on board Gulf ports) averaged US\$281 a tonne in the week ending 26 October 2011, compared with US\$280 a tonne in the previous week.
- The world wheat indicator price (US hard red winter, free on board Gulf ports) averaged US\$307 a tonne in the week ending 25 October 2011, compared with US\$298 a tonne in the previous week.
- The world cotton indicator price (the Cotlook 'A' index) averaged US108.1 cents a pound in the week ending 26 October 2011, the lowest price in 13 months.
- Saleyard lamb prices eased in most states in the week ending 21 October 2011.
- Saleyard cattle prices in the week ending 21 October 2011 were generally lower, with the Queensland young cattle indicator price falling by 16 cents to 373 cents a kilogram.
- Most fruit and vegetable prices were lower or steady in the week ending 22 October 2011, with only pumpkin prices increasing. Banana prices were 23 per cent lower.
- The world sugar indicator price fell 2.8 per cent in the week ending 26 October 2011, to US26.7 cents a pound.

1. Climate


1.1. Notable events

- For the week ending 26 October 2011, rainfall was recorded in all states and territories with the highest falls received in northern and south-west Australia. The highest measured total for the week was 461 millimetres at Babinda in far north Queensland.
- Rainfall received this week over southern Australia will assist grain fill in crops in the lead up to harvest.
 The rain may have caused some harvest delays in Western Australia's northern wheat belt.
- Lightning associated with thunderstorms in western Queensland has started a number of large
 grassfires. Fires burning in Queensland's central-west and far south-west last week have been
 contained, but have caused significant damage to pastures in some areas. There are few reports of any
 stock losses. Natural Disaster Relief and Recovery Arrangements for the Queensland Bushfires (August
 to October 2011) have been made available for 26 Local Government Areas.
- Large numbers of cotton bollworms have been found in canola crops in the north-west cropping region of New South Wales. The bollworms can damage crops including cotton, maize, chickpeas, lucerne and lupins. The extent of any damage is unknown, but control measures are underway.
- The tropical Pacific Ocean is now in the early stages of a late-forming La Niña event. Models suggest a
 further strengthening of the event is likely through until mid-summer 2011–12. Current observations and
 outlooks indicate that this La Niña will be considerably weaker than the strong 2010–11 event (Bureau of
 Meteorology ENSO 'Wrap-up', 26 October 2011).
- Wetter conditions are favoured across large parts of northern, eastern and south-west Australia over the November 2010 to January 2012 period. A warm Indian Ocean is the main contributor to this outlook (Bureau of Meteorology National Seasonal Rainfall Outlook, 25 October 2011).
- Warmer days and nights are favoured across south-east Australia for the November 2011 to January 2012 period. Cooler days are favoured for parts of south-east Queensland and north-east New South Wales (Bureau of Meteorology National Seasonal Temperature Outlook, 25 October 2011).


Rainfall for the week ending 26 October 2011




1.3. Temperature anomalies this week

Maximum temperature anomalies for the week ending 25 October 2011




Minimum temperature anomalies for the week ending 25 October 2011



Total forecast rainfall for the period 27 October to 3 November 2011




Chance of exceeding the median rainfall - November 2011 to January 2012

Chance of exceeding the median minimum temperature - November 2011 to January 2012




2. Water

2.1. Water availability

 Water storage levels in the Murray-Darling Basin decreased this week by 92 gigalitres (GL) but remained at approximately 88 per cent of total capacity. This is 13 percentage points or 2979 GL more than this time last year.




3.1. Production and commodities

- The world coarse grains indicator price (US no. 2 yellow corn, free on board Gulf ports) averaged US\$281 a tonne in the week ending 26 October 2011, compared with US\$280 a tonne in the previous week.
- The world cotton indicator price (the Cotlook 'A' index) averaged US108.1 cents a pound in the week ending 26 October 2011, the lowest price in 13 months. The last time the world cotton indicator price fell below US110 cents a pound was in the week ending 22 September 2010, when it was US108.6 cents a pound.
- The world wheat indicator price (US hard red winter, free on board Gulf ports) averaged US\$307 a tonne in the week ending 25 October 2011, compared with US\$298 a tonne in the previous week.
- The President of Ukraine signed a law abolishing export taxes on wheat and corn. An export tax remains on barley until 1 January 2012.
- Saleyard lamb prices eased in most states in the week ending 21 October 2011. This was most
 noticeable in Victoria and South Australia, where an increase in lambs yarded resulted in prices in both
 states declining to 498 cents a kilogram. Despite lamb yardings remaining seasonally low, saleyard lamb
 prices in Western Australia decreased by 6 per cent to 431 cents a kilogram, reflecting lower quality
 lambs at the Katanning saleyards. In New South Wales, prices decreased by 2 per cent to 393 cents a
 kilogram. Lamb prices in Tasmania remained relatively steady, averaging 511 cents a kilogram.
- Saleyard sheep prices in the week ending 21 October 2011 were mixed. In Western Australia, sheep prices increased by 6 per cent to 362 cents a kilogram. Sheep prices in South Australia increased by 1 per cent to 334 cents a kilogram. In Victoria, the offering of lower quality sheep resulted in saleyard prices holding relatively steady at 351 cents a kilogram. Sheep throughput in New South Wales declined, however were higher compared with the same week in the previous season. As a result, prices in New South Wales declined by 5 per cent to 519 cents a kilogram.
- The Eastern Market Indicator price for wool fell by 2 cents in the week ending 20 October 2011, to 1158 cents a kilogram clean, despite the number of bales offered at auction increasing by 11 per cent compared with the previous week.
- Saleyard cattle prices for the week ending 21 October 2011 were generally lower. The Queensland young cattle indicator price fell by 16 cents to 373 cents a kilogram. Young cattle prices also fell in all other states except South Australia. Heavy steer prices fell in all states, while medium cow prices fell in Queensland and Tasmania, but rose in all other states.
- The world sugar indicator price (Intercontinental Exchange, nearby futures, no. 11 contract) fell 2.8 per cent to US26.7 cents a pound in the week ending 26 October 2011, after a two week period of increases related to deteriorating harvest conditions in Brazil and floods in Thailand.
- Wholesale prices of avocadoes, bananas and melons were lower in the week ending 22 October 2011.
 Banana prices (cavendish variety) declined by 23 per cent but were still more than five times higher than at the same time in 2010. Mango prices (kensington pride variety) were 7 per cent lower than at the same time in 2010, reflecting improved mango supplies in 2011.
- Most vegetable wholesale prices were lower in the week ending 22 October 2011, with pumpkins amongst the few vegetables whose prices rose.




Weekly wholesale prices for selected fruit, Melbourne market







Weekly wholesale prices for selected vegetables, Melbourne market







